Supreme Director's Message

My brothers in Christ,

Faith, Charity and Growth: On June 2008, Pope Benedict XVI began a new cycle of catechesis, turning his attention to St. Paul the Apostle to whom the current Pauline Year is dedicated. Saint Paul is an example of complete dedication to the Lord and to His Church, as well as of great openness to humanity and its cultures. The Apostle Paul is an important model from whom we still have much to learn, and not a

figure of the past that we recall with veneration. Saint Paul's significance in the history of Christianity can hardly be underestimated: an indefatigable missionary, the first interpreter of the Good News of Jesus Christ to the Gentile world. The Pope explained the Pauline Year serves "to listen to him and to learn from him, as from a master, the faith and the truth in which the reasons for the unity of Christ's disciples are rooted".



In a world where lies are so powerful, truth is paid with suffering. Those who wish to avoid suffering, to keep it away, keep away life itself and its greatness; they cannot be servants of truth or servants of the faith. Where there is nothing worth suffering for, life itself loses value. The Eucharist - the focus of our being Christian - is founded on Jesus' sacrifice for us; it was born of the suffering of love.

On May 15, four judges overturned the votes of over four million California voters and the teaching of our faith. Marriage comes from the loving hand of God, who fashioned both male and female in the divine image. A man "leaves his father and mother and clings to his wife, and the two of them become one body" (Gn 2:24). The man recognizes the woman as "bone of my bones and flesh of my flesh" (Gn 2:23). God blesses the man and woman and commands them to "be fertile and multiply" (Gn 1:28). Jesus reiterates these teachings from Genesis, saying, "But from the beginning of creation, 'God made them male and female. For this reason a man shall leave his father and mother [and be joined to his wife], and the two shall become one flesh'" (Mk 10:6-8). These biblical passages help us to appreciate God's plan for marriage.

Marriage is both a natural institution and a sacred union because it is rooted in the divine plan for creation. Jesus Christ made marriage a symbol of his love for his Church. This means that a sacramental marriage lets the world see, in human terms, something of the faithful, creative, abundant, and self-emptying love of Christ. A true marriage in the Lord with his grace will bring the spouses to holiness.

The same-sex "marriage" movement in the United States will pose a very serious challenge to the Church in coming years. A conflict is on the horizon that will affect every aspect of church-state relations.

The ultimate strategy of the same-sex marriage movement is to delegitimize the Catholic faith in the United States. This movement views the Church as its main opponent, and argues that the Church's teaching on marriage is the moral equivalent of support for racism. Through legal and other means, same-sex marriage proponents are attempting to isolate and silence the Church by proposing that her teaching and practices are not only bigoted, but also unlawful. This November, Californian voters are called to make a major decision. What are we called to do over the next few months to insure the success of Proposition Number 8?

1. Prayer; find Jesus on our daily road;
2. Volunteer your efforts at the parish and diocesan level;
3. Donate your time and financial support to the Protect Marriage Campaign (ProtectMarriage.com)

The state has a primary and fundamental obligation to protect and promote the family, which is rooted in marriage and sustained by it. We must strengthen our resolve to respect the dignity of each human being as well as to protect the sanctity of marriage. This

situation in our state offers each an opportunity to be true witnesses of our faith, following the examples of Saint Paul, John Paul II and Benedict XVI.

Thank you for keeping Father Michael J. McGivney dream alive; **now is the hour of the Knights of Columbus, now is the hour of one family in one true faith, now is the time to stand up and be counted**

State Warden's Message

Would you be willing to sign?

We have just celebrated the signing of the Declaration of Independence and our Nation's Birthday, so I would like to reflect on what this means. The signers risked their public reputation, committed an act of treason against the King that would result to the loss of their lives and placed their families in danger.

How about you? Would you be willing to sign such document? Would you risk it all for an unknown outcome? Would you risk your life based on skills of local minuteman, local rebels, against the King's mighty Army and Navy. Of course you would, you have over two hundred and thirty years of hindsight.

How about now? "Are we willing to risk our public reputation and friendship for a moral cause?" It is easy to vote based on our moral judgment within the privacy of the ballot box but are we willing to publicly support moral issues? I know this is not easy. I have and continue to serve as a public servant. A condition of my employment and law, I must appear neutral and unbiased at work and in the public square. Violating this could cost me my job and my family's financial stability.

Despite the personal risk, I am making a public stand on a ballot measure coming before the voters in Nov. The proposition is to amend the California constitution defining marriage as the union of one man and one woman, Proposition 8. Join me and publicly support this measure. My Brother Knights,

As mentioned at last month's District Deputy meeting in Ontario, this will be the first of my monthly letters from the California State Circle. I spoke with many of you from the podium about my intention to communicate the role of the Columbian Squires as an integral organization within the Knights of Columbus.



Most importantly, the Columbian Squires, as "the official youth organization of the Knights of Columbus," is itself an Order. The now Venerable Michael J. McGivney founded the Knights of Columbus in 1882. A Christian Brother named Barnabas founded the Columbian Squires in 1925. Council No. 1 is located in New Haven, Connecticut. Circle No. 1 can be found in Duluth, Minnesota. To become a full Knight, you must take the Third Degree. To become a Squire, you must be invested. The comparison is conclusive – the Columbian Squires is an Order, not a "program." This is an important distinction. In the months ahead, I will tell you who the Squires are and not what they are. I think you will find that those who call themselves Squires are unique among Catholic youth.

Due to circumstances, our usual June convention will be held at California State University San Bernardino (CSUSB) on the weekend of 11-13 July. The groundwork for having the convention at CSUSB was laid by 18 year old State Chief Squire Stephen Codekas. For those of you who may not know, Squire Stephen has already taken his Fourth Degree. Brother Stephen became Sir Knight Stephen at the February exemplification in Ontario. In addition to speaking with the convention planning staff at CSUSB, Stephen also contacted the Chancery of the Diocese of San Bernardino and was successful in having Auxiliary Bishop Rutilio del Riego offer the convention Mass for the boys and counselors. This can only be topped by Stephen's lifelong desire to become a priest, and for this we pray for a successful discernment and acceptance into a seminary. The State Circle has indeed been blessed to have had Stephen Codekas as our State Chief Squire during the 2007-2008 Columbian Year.

To add dignity to our convention's opening ceremony on Friday evening, July 11th, the Color Corps of Msgr. Edward J. Flanagan Assembly of Riverside will present and post the colors. On Saturday afternoon, the Fray Francisco Dumetz Color Corps will provide the honor guard for Bishop del Riego as he celebrates Mass and for the installation of officers to follow. My thanks to Southern District Marshal Dietrich Rubelius for making the arrangements and to Color Corps Commanders Ed Romero of the Riverside Assembly and Jose Quiroz of the Colton Assembly for their participation.

Dress Code Notes

Dress for events should be specified by the nature of the event. It will be dictated by this and should then be communicated to the people coming to the event. As all Protocol, this is only common courtesy. So let's discuss some of the more common forms of dress based on events.

Formal attire: This would be tuxedo for men and formal gowns for ladies at 4th Degree events such as Installations and Exemplifications; State Convention Dinner, or could include Chapter Installations/Testimonials.

Cocktail attire: This would be business suits for men and cocktail outfits for ladies at State Convention Dinner, Chapter Installations/Testimonials, or Council major anniversary events.

Business attire: This would be business suits for men and dresses or pants suits for ladies at other State Convention events, Chapter Installations/Testimonials, DD Meeting, other major State events, or Council installations.

Business casual attire: This would be sports coat and tie for men and church wear for ladies at State Officers' meetings or State Corporation meetings, Chapter Installations/Testimonials depending on location and other events associated with them, some State meetings such as Planning meeting, or Council functions and meetings. This would be the minimum if Mass is part of the proceedings.

Casual attire: This would be good jeans or sports slacks and sports shirt or collared shirt for men and the same for ladies at Chapter Picnics, State/Chapter Free Throw Contests, or any level picnic or outdoor event.

Never should attire be shorts, tank tops, swimsuits unless swimming or a beach environment is the location of the event. Also do not call out types of dress as "California casual," "Business Friday casual," or other such titles. They mean different things and modes of dress to different people. If none of these describe the dress expected at the event please be very detailed about what you do expect in the letter inviting the people who are expected to participate.

Knights provide new wheels for area vets

Gift of wheelchairs is welcomed by local VA

The Veterans Affairs (VA) Northern California Health Care System received a most welcome gift last week when 25 new wheelchairs were rolled into the Rancho Cordova VA facility.

The chairs were a gift from the Northern California chapters of the Knights of Columbus fraternal organization in conjunction with the Wheelchair Foundation and will eventually include a total of 50 chairs.

On Friday, members from several Knights chapters presented the chairs to VA officials during a short ceremony at the medical center.

Charles Clark, state warden for the Knights' California State Council acted as emcee and group spokesperson for the event.

Clark said it was gratifying to know that the chairs would be used by, "those brave men and women who served with honor and dignity and now need our help."

Dr. Brian O'Neill, director of the Northern California Healthcare System for the Department of Veteran's Affairs was on hand to accept the wheelchair donation.

"It is my honor to be the recipient of these wheelchairs on behalf of the 63,000 veterans who utilize the VA Northern California healthcare system," he said. "As a physician who takes care of the people who will occupy these wheelchairs, I personally want to thank you from the bottom of my heart."

The wheelchairs now will be distributed among the four Northern California VA medical facilities. Donations for the sleek black and red chairs came from all of the Knights of Columbus organizations—three councils and five assemblies—in Northern California, including Rancho Cordova's Blessed Sacrament council. The effort began shortly after Veteran's Day last year and was spearheaded by the Christ the King council based in Citrus Heights.

Worldwide, the Knights of Columbus, a Catholic men's fraternal organization boasts more than 1.6 members. There are 2,500 councils in the United States, Canada, Mexico, the Philippines, Puerto Rico, Cuba, the Dominican Republic, Panama, the Bahamas, the Virgin Islands, Guatemala, Guam and Saipan.

During the past 10 years, Knights of Columbus organizations have volunteered more than

545 million hours of service and donated over \$1.1 billion to charity.

At the local level, officials are able to decide with which causes they will become involved. And when it came to raising money to buy wheelchairs for veterans, Clark said it was an easy decision.

“It’s just the right thing to do,” he said.

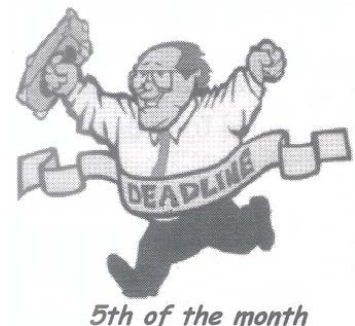
